Over the past several years the Ranger School Alumni Association (RSAA) has been impacted by a number of significant challenges that we have had to overcome including the pandemic, the retirement of long time Office Manager Gail Simmons and the resignation of several key RSAA officers. The past six months have been a revitalization time for the RSAA as we try to get things back on track on running smoothly and efficiently. The Board of Directors has been working diligently, meeting on a regular basis both in person and via zoom. We have been able to get back into the RSAA office in the Ranger School and have brought in some new members to the RSAA staff, leadership and Board of Directors.

We do understand that there have been some Alumni who have not been able to connect with the Alumni Office and that your messages were not responded to in a timely manner. We have been working to correct this situation as best as possible and hope these efforts will be apparent to all alumni.

As I write this, I think back to the weekend I just spent at the campground (October 22-24). Even though it got down to 24 degrees Saturday night, it was worth it to be at our wonderful alumni property. The views of the river, the camaraderie around the bonfire, and the wonderful memories shared of our time at the Ranger School. If you



haven't been up to camp at our campground or stayed at our Alumni House lately, I highly recommend it. Speaking of our Alumni House, we have some changes that you should all be aware of. Starting for the 2022 season, there will be a change in the price for staying at the Alumni House. We will no longer have a family rate and a group rate. Instead we will be going to a flat rate for all stays. The new rate is \$125 per night. Along with this new rate, we will no longer be charging a separate Covid cleaning fee for each stay. The new rate hike will cover this cost. As always, if you want to stay at the Alumni house, please fill out your Alumni House reservation request form. We'll try our best to get you the dates you want to stay there. If we have any open dates after we fill the requests, we'll post them on social media so keep watch. We would also like to thank all that stayed at the house and the campground. Your donations help cover the costs of upkeep, bills and taxes. If you stay at the campground, we ask that you please donate \$15 per night per site. There is a slot on the side of the garage where you can place your donations. Some basic rules for the use of the campground:

- •The campground is a carry in, carry out facility. Please leave your campsite cleaner than you left it.





#### Do you want to Zoom with your classmates and friends?



# **30 Years and Counting**By James Savage





I arrived in Wanakena in the fall of 1991 following an apparently successful 2-day interview which included a lecture to the students about 'forest stewardship' and forest management plans. The school had been hunting for 2 new faculty members that fall, due to the recent retirements of Kerm Remele and Chuck Martin. Dr. Michael Bridgen had been hired to start at the beginning of the spring semester, in January of 1992, but my initiation would come mid-way through the first semester for the Class of 1992. The class had the upper hand. They had already been in Wanakena for a couple of months, and they weren't planning to make it easy for the incoming rookie professors, neither of which had graduated from the Ranger School. They seemed to challenge everything that Mike and I said, did, and thought. It didn't help that my first assignment was to teach Aerial Photogrammetry, one of my weakest subjects. Things did get better, but not easier, during my second semester when I was able to teach to my strengths in 'structure and growth,' 'forest mensuration,' and 'forest recreation.'

During that first semester, I had the great pleasure of working with people like Wes Suhr and Diane Perry, who were both filling in while the college conducted their faculty search. Diane, a Ranger School grad, was the first woman to serve as a professor at the School and was teaching the first-semester mensuration (forest measurements) course. Wes, a former Ranger School prof, had come out of retirement to teach Dendrology. At the time, Chris Westbrook was a confident and energetic young faculty member who would be promoted to serve as Director just a few years later. The Director at the time, my first boss at the school, was Mr. Richard Miller. That guy had been at the school so long (at the time, 25 years seemed like a long stint), that he had developed his own kooky language, a 'rinky-dink' dialect that few understood but all were entertained by. Rounding out the teaching squad that year was the always congenial Kevin O'Neill. I will always have many fond memories of working with these fine people.

Not all the memories are happy ones. It's been sad to see some of my colleagues move on, or retire, or even pass on...to lose and attend funerals for former students who had their whole careers ahead of them...to see some Ranger School traditions (like axe sharpening, Reinhardt lettering, 2-chain tapes, and sanctioned keg parties) fade and disappear. Sad, indeed, but brighter news is never far away: another class-couple just got married, a former student just had her first baby, one former student just landed their dream job while another just finished graduate school, a promising, young faculty member was just hired, enrollment is up, the 1960s bathrooms WILL be renovated soon, I get to teach dendrology (I'm actually in my second year of teaching dendrology, which has quickly become one of my all-time favorites)!

I'll spare you the blow by blow of the full 30 years, but suffice it to say that each and every year has been challenging, enjoyable, memorable, and rewarding. Since my start in 1991, I've taught 13 different courses in nearly as many subject areas. I've had the honor and pleasure of working with 4 College Presidents, 1 interim President, 5 Department Chairs, and 4 Ranger School Directors, plus numerous faculty, visiting instructors, teaching assistants, and staff (clerical, custodial, kitchen, and facilities).

And through all the teaching, service, and scholarship activities, I've had to adapt to constant change.

When I first came to the Ranger School, there was no internet (available to and useable by the public), no websites, no email, no GNSS/GPS (available for public use), no user-friendly versions of GIS, no smartphones or 'apps,' no color copiers, no laptop computers or tablets, no flash drives or external hard drives, no drones, no vans (we used 'cattle trucks' to haul the students around!), no fancy classrooms or dining hall, no fiber-optic cables, no distance-learning capabilities, no such thing as Zoom, no PowerPoint, no Blackboard, no social media sites like Facebook, no residence hall director (the faculty monitored the dorms during evenings AND weekends!), no Land Surveying program, no Environmental and Natural Resources Conservation program, no advisory committees, and no pandemics. You get the picture: many changes have occurred since I started teaching. But Ranger School faculty, staff, and students have successfully adapted to these changes and, moreover, have grown and improved as a result of them. In fact, enrollment is the highest it has been since I started, and jobs for our graduates are plentiful. And, thanks to many of you, we have a healthy endowment fund, something else that didn't exist when I first came to the school. The Ranger School could not have adapted, grown, and improved as it has without this important fund.

What will the next 30 years bring to the Ranger School? I don't plan to stay on quite that long to find out, but I do hope that the job is as dynamic, exciting, and rewarding for current and future faculty as it has been for me. To the administrators, faculty, staff, and students that I have worked with, thank you all for your support, for teaching me so much, and for being the most fantastic group of people that I could have ever hoped to work with. To 30 years, and all the years that ensue ~ Cheers!




When making purchases from Amazon, don't forget about the RSAA!

#### News from the Wanakena Historical Association

On August 21, 2021, the WHA sponsored two very special events:

The unveiling and dedication of the two-sided steel sign recognizing the 1912 founding of the Ranger School in Wanakena.

The opening and dedication of the new Wanakena History Center on Second Street. Both of these events were well attended on a perfect warm sunny day in Wanakena.

The sign was possible through a grant from the Pomeroy Foundation. The sign is strategically placed on the corner of Second St and Ranger School Rd so that it can be seen by everyone entering Wanakena. The ceremony was led by WHA Trustee Paul Flynn with a presentation by Director Mariann Johnston who gave a memorable historical summary of how the Ranger School came to be, highlighting the significant roles of Wanakenan, J Otto Hamele and Hugh Baker, Dean of the School of Forestry at Syracuse University. Mariann recalled the similarities in the challenges of both the first Wanakena residents (relocated from Granere PA by Rich Lumber Co. in 1903) and the first students at the Ranger School in 1912-1914. As both groups arrived in Wanakena, they had to build their own residences and buildings in the Adirondack wilderness. The opening of the History Center resulted in accolades and surprise by some.

The varied exhibits on display include timelines of Wanakena and the Ranger School and displays of pictures, descriptions and artifacts of life in early Wanakena. Most visitors stayed to watch the 9 minute slide show of images about early town life in Wanakena. The displays on logging and the Ranger School also received high praise.

# *Director's Report, November 2021*By Mariann Johnston, Director November 15, 2022

Greetings from the Director's Office at the Ranger School. As you know, we are now well into the Fall semester. While other colleges have been struggling to maintain enrollment, we are hosting our largest class in several decades. We started with 67 students, and still



have 64 enrolled. The last class that approached this size was the Class of 2016, with 63 students graduating. Students in the Class of 2022 are experiencing all of the normal pangs associated with stand typing, total stations, taping and pacing proficiencies, and the various projects bearing down at this time. The anxieties are mostly normal, but we are also reminded that the current group of students (mostly college sophomores) finished their senior year of high school, and in many cases their entire freshman year, remotely. They may have never been away from home before. This brings some new challenges such as having to learn time management skills, and learning how to interact (appropriately) with peers and teachers. As we move into the Spring semester, we look forward to

continuing to build specialized field skills and developing career networks, including engaging with alumni when possible.

Moving into the Summer, we anticipate the Sustainable Resources Management Department students from Syracuse coming to the Ranger School for their 4-week summer program, starting on Memorial Day weekend as usual. We will also be hosting the DEC Forest Ranger Basic School (e.g. Ranger Academy) starting in late May. This will be a new experience for us and for the Rangers, but we look forward to hosting many of our alumni amongst both the new recruits and the Instructional staff. The Basic School will be held on campus through the first week in August, when they will head to Oriskany to spend a few weeks on some of the high-risk training (whitewater rescue, fast driving, etc.).

Around the time the Rangers leave, we will be looking forward to hosting the 2022 Alumni Reunion, as long as COVID continues to decline. We are doing everything in our power to ensure a safe in-person event. Your RSAA officers are working hard to organize and prepare for this event, already less than a year away. Food plans are being made, and activities discussed. You are highly encouraged to start considering your lodging arrangements now, as we anticipate a large attendance. The Reunion Committee will be providing more information.

I'll wrap up with the news that we are finally moving forward on our long-awaited auxiliary building. We have contracted an architectural firm to develop renderings the new multi-use space. This will include a gymnasium that can be converted to an auditorium by the use of expanding bleachers, so that we may hold our graduation ceremonies on campus. It will include locker rooms, showers, and storage for our hockey equipment, balls, field games, and other recreational equipment. We hope to also incorporate a small residential center with suites and additional classrooms, that will allow for visiting groups to hold small meetings, or for married student housing, visitors, and the like. Once we have the renderings in place, I anticipate a capital campaign will likely be launched, to help fund this new building and allow us to grow what we do so well. As always, I think all of you for your continued support of the Ranger School and our students. Please don't hesitate to reach out with your thoughts and ideas.
