Director's Report:

As I write this letter in early December, the sky is gray and a light snow is falling. We've already had a major snow-storm November 20-21, but winter has not quite settled-in yet.

Ranger School has been a busy place this past summer. Immediately after graduation, the Student Conservation Society and the NYS DEC offered a one-week training program for assistant forest rangers and backcountry stewards. As they were walking out the doors, students from ESF's FNRM summer program moved in for their 4-week training session. Shortly afterwards, the New York State Soil and Water Conservation Districts held a Leadership Training program at the Ranger School, promoted by alumnus Bob Brower. We also held a 4-week long summer bridge program, and hosted two weeks of EFB's summer programs, due to an excess number of students at the Cranberry Lake Biology Station. All-in-all, it was a busy summer.

The full class of Ranger School students arrived on August 14, with a total of forty nine students. New students gathered along the shore of the Oswegatchie River, and received their new hardhats from the faculty, who welcomed them to the School. This year's class has demonstrated the same type of dedication, resourcefulness, and "uniqueness" as previous classes.

Alumni Property Update from the 2nd VP:

Winter greetings to all Ranger School Alumni. The Alumni Board again met in October at the Alumni House and enjoyed an outdoor Board meeting with the help of a nice fire to keep us warm. Board members stayed the weekend and performed the usual close down of the house. The water is turned off, the pipes are drained, the campground is cleaned up and we even had some snow. The House was used extensively this summer and we hope that all the Alumni and families had a great time utilizing this valuable asset of the Association. Thanks to anyone who sent back the survey we conducted last year about the future of the house and any improvements we can make. We got some great responses that ranged from "don't change a thing" to asking that we don't ever get rid of the wicker furniture on the porch. So at this point, we have no major changes to the house but will continue a program of aggressive maintenance.

One thing that has come up is the property is being utilized more and more by 'outside' groups due to the increased utilization of the Ranger School during the summer months and the newly enforced prohibition of alcohol on the campus. For instance, we were able to bring a group of County, State and Federal Soil and Water Conservation professionals to the school for a weeklong Leadership Training. At night, the group utilized a campsite to enjoy the outdoors, mingle and have some camaraderie (sound familiar to us?). There are plans for the Council of Eastern Forest Technology School (CEFTS) annual meeting to be held right before Alumni Weekend this August and Dr. Bridgen has requested use of the Alumni house and grounds for their utilization. My point in all this is that the Board is contemplating taking an area above the campsites to level off and build a more weather proof shelter. Plans are in the preliminary stages but we may be moving forward with this idea.

This past year, a couple of alumni (Scott & Beth Carpenter '81) offered to build us a new dining table for the house. We expect to have it by Alumni Weekend. I was able to secure a set of eight oak chairs to be used around the new table. I also have upgraded a couple of the end tables at the suggestion of several of the survey respondents. The big trees along the road were dropped by a crew from National Grid and were cut up during the spring work weekend. Our next challenge is that the septic system needs to be uncovered, evaluated and pumped before the summer season. We also will be looking at the outhouse – we believe we are getting rainwater into the tank and causing our odor issue.

All in all, we had a great year, the house is in decent shape and we look forward to any input all Alumni have on improvements to 'our house' and campgrounds. Construction Project Planned at the Ranger School:

Over the next two summers some very exciting and necessary work is going to be happening at The Ranger School. Contractors have until January 3rd 2017 to have their bids in place for the State University Construction Fund Project. The project is titled, Wanakena Ranger School – Various Building and Site Improvements. Work is slated to begin around the 3rd week of May 2017.

The project can be broken down into these three areas: Main Building, Site Work, and the Maintenance Shop. Considerable effort has been given in order to not disrupt any of the programs during the two summers of construction.

The main entrance to the School will be replaced with an impressive two-story-tall "sally port". The Main Building is going to receive new entry canopies, along with exterior door replacement. Certain doors will be fitted with Card Access Control readers as well. The project will also deal with some foundation drain issues associated with the 60's wing of the Main Building.

The portion of the project that deals with Site Work is very extensive. In this portion we will be seeing the replacement of roadways, walks and stairs. Replacement of the ageing Storm and Sanitary systems will also be taking place. This will include both piping and structures.

The Maintenance Shop will also be receiving some attention. A new roof along with entry canopies are to be installed. Drainage issues will also be dealt with at the Maintenance Shop.

From the Archives: The Ranger School Class of 1916 Kathy Smith Greenwald '79

A picture of the Class of 1916 on snowshoes on the Oswegatchie River appeared in the January, 1929, "Bulletin of the New York State College of Forestry at Syracuse University." In the background, the dining hall (now the Director's residence) is on the left and the classroom and living quarters are in the long building on the right.



A century ago, the Class of 1916 had 27 graduates and was the largest Ranger School class prior to 1921. Their last names were Allen, Andrews, Church, Currie, Fletcher, Hulette, Johnson, another Johnson, Keller, Korsgard, Lansing, MacPherson, Marshall, McCaffery, Meilimger, O'Brien, Piper, Powell, Rogers, Schrader, Scott, Shew, Stolz, Taft, Tempest, Wheeler, and Wolff. The excellent reputation of the Ranger School was well known as indicated by the fact that one third of the students came from places outside of New York State, including Pennsylvania, Florida, Illinois, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Colorado, and even Mexico. The Class of 1916 included two residents of Wanakena, Robert ("Skip") Lansing and Ward Stoltz. Skip Lansing's grandson currently resides in Wanakena and his granddaughter is now Wanakena's postmistress.

WANAKENA FOOTBRIDGE UPDATE

&

THANK-YOU

The Wanakena Historical Association (WHA) is extremely grateful and thanks the RSAA for their awesome support in getting the Wanakena footbridge rebuilt. The bridge construction is now 98% complete and was opened to pedestrian traffic on November 9, 2016, a joyous day in the annals of Wanakena history. Everyone who comes into town has a big HAPPY SMILE. The current plans for a dedication ceremony is being planned for July 4th or that holiday weekend. As plans develop, we will post updates on the Wanakena Historical Association Facebook page.

The Westbrook challenge in July, brought in 102 donations which totaled \$30,031!!! that was still needed to cover the predicted cost. Additional donations & memorials received in July/August totaled over \$15,000. A total of over \$180,000 has been raised by the WHA, an amazing feat for a small hamlet nestled on the edge of the Adirondack wilderness.

Then, in late August there was the bad news!! Removing the old and installing new anchors (humongous buried blocks of cement) to which the steel cables are connected was <u>not part of the reconstruction proposal</u>. It was assumed, after an inspection of one of the old anchors, that they did not have to be replaced. But, during construction, it was determined that the 114-year-old anchors did have to be replaced. This increased the cost by more than \$70,000!! The WHA was disappointed, disillusioned and depressed to think of having to raise more money.

A possible source of another grant has been identified and Sue Westbrook, Town of Fine Supervisor, is currently working on the paperwork to secure a matching grant that we are very hopeful will cover the additional costs. With the additional money raised since July, we have our fingers & toes crossed that it will be sufficient to match the money needed for the anchors.

Again, Thank-You, Thank-You to everyone who has donated money, time and support to rebuild the iconic Wanakena footbridge. Special thanks to Sue Westbrook and the Town of Fine who approved construction to commence before all the funds were raised.

I hope to see you at the celebration and dedication ceremony in July, or sometime soon to see your big HAPPY SMILE as you can once again meander across the swinging bridge suspended over the Oswegatchie and know that you helped to make it happen.

The Legacy Scholarship: (Alumni Memorial Scholarship)

When the RSAA Board of Directors was faced with a decision about how to handle unrestricted gifts left to the Association in a person's will or in memory of an Alumnus who has passed, they thought to set up a scholarship. While the RS and the RSAA have a number of named scholarships in honor of individual Alumnus, Professors and Directors, there had not been a RS Alumni Scholarship to honor all Alumni.

In 2012-2013, the Board created a scholarship (Legacy) using funds left to us in Gordon Hughes' will, and funds donated in memory of Klint Wigren '62, Mrs. Decoteau, Thomas Dailey '57, Bill Ehlers '62 and others. Our goal was to have this fund grow to a minimum of \$25,000, the necessary level to endow a scholarship with the College Foundation. With these donations, along with other donations since, we have now reached the amount to have the fund endowed, and possibly by next year the first Legacy Scholarship may be awarded to a Ranger School student.

The award criteria for this scholarship, as decided by the Board are as follows:

- 1) This scholarship is for a relative of a Ranger School graduate.
- 2) The scholarship is to be based on financial need.
- 3) The scholarship is to be awarded as an upfront tuition payment.
