#### Trees, Alumni, and COVID-19

As I get ready for another day in our world affected by COVID-19 I reflect on the fact that some things have gone unchanged, like trees and much of the natural world, and some things have changed immensely. I find some sanctuary in being able to walk in the forest, but the changes caused by this pandemic seem to follow me there too. As a growth of virtual meetings has occurred in response to us not being able to meet in person one can now conduct meetings at home, in the office, or perhaps while still in the woods while working. While this virtual world is very convenient, it is somewhat less personal and lacks true human contact. But, this approach to conducting business does seem to be a necessity for now.

With that said, the effects of COVID-19 have rippled through the educational world leading the RSAA board to cancel our annual meeting and restrict the opening of the alumni house and camp-ground until it is determined to be appropriate to open. These actions come with several burdens for the association: most notable is that the donations given for the use of the alumni house and campgrounds cover the maintenance, upkeep and taxes of the property. As many of you are aware last year the board of directors took on several major and necessary repairs to the house and the property. We had hoped to continue this momentum this year with some necessary upgrades to the kitchen. At this time, it is uncertain if any upgrades will occur as we will need to be certain that the minimal expenses of ownership are met first (taxes and insurance).

Due to the cancellation of the annual meeting and as a move to reduce costs the board of directors decided to produce the Alumni News in a digital format for distribution, with a limited number of hard copies available. We are receiving a growing number of requests for hard copies of the Alumni News. This publication is produced in units of 100. In an attempt to meet the needs of our fellow alumni we are preparing to have a limited number of the annual Alumni News books printed, we are still assessing how many to print and what the cost is associated with this. We need to hear from the alumni who need a hard copy instead of a digital copy soon. I should state that moving the publication to a digital copy is only being done for the 2020 addition and in a response to how COVID-19 is affecting our association.

We are still working on how to handle recognizing classes and award recipients, as we normally would at our annual meeting. At this time, we are going to do the best we can to continue with recognition of classes and award recipients, with the exception that we will have to mail recipients of awards their plaques. We will officially recognize all classes and award recipients from 2020 at the 2021 annual meeting. There will be some extra cost and effort for the board of directors in handling our recognitions and awards this way, but we feel that it is important to do this and carry on our traditions as well as we can.

To maintain the financial stability of the association we are asking for donations to help maintain our organization through this time. We are adding a Donation Button to our Facebook page (<u>https://</u>

www.facebook.com/RSAAinc) for anyone who wishes to make a donation, in addition anyone who wishes to mail in donations can still do so. It is worth noting that the Class of 74 has started the fund drive by donating \$250.00 towards covering these costs.

## How was Ranger School affected by the Spanish Influenza?



The Class of 1918 only had ten students. Thirtyeight year old Director Seward D. Smith had to send one student home due to influenza. That student was Mr. Donald T. Mason, who later recovered, married in 1921, and became a life insurance underwriter.

The Class of 1919 had twelve students, and a new Director, thirty-seven year old Robert Craig, Jr. One of his students, Mr. Kurt Adam, withdrew from School due to influenza. He also recovered and returned to finish the program.

Although unrelated to influenza, one student in the Class of 1919 was shot and killed during a hunting accident on the Ranger School forest. He was Nelson F. Jonas of Great Bend, NY.
